PART I ITEMS CONSIDERED IN THE PRESENCE OF THE PUBLIC AND PRESS

23. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors B Cooper, P Dixon, S Pender and D Rathbone.

24. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST/DISPENSATIONS

There were no disclosures of interest made at the meeting.

25. EXCLUSION OF PRESS AND PUBLIC

There were no excluded items on the agenda.

26. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED, that the Chair be authorised to sign as a correct record the minutes of the meeting held on 18 July 2023.

27. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Mr Cox, a local resident was invited by the Chair to address the Locality Board to present a petition which had been signed by 77 residents.

The petition requested the creation of a single lane carriage way with a 20 mph zone along Aynam Road, Kendal.

Following his statement regarding the petition, the Chair thanked Mr Cox for his contribution to the meeting and noted that a written response would be provided by officers.

Members expressed their support for the petition and understanding of the current issues faced by the residents of Aynam Road.

28. PRESENTATION FROM KIER CONSTRUCTION

Members received a presentation regarding the Structures Renewal Scheme on the M6 Lune Gorge (the Scheme) from Kier Construction. The presentation set out the following:-

- background to the Scheme;
- the provisional timescales for options, design and construction;
- Stakeholders engaged with so far;
- next steps for the Scheme; and
- an offering called Caring for Cumbria which was a social value project developed by the M6 Lune Gorge Scheme.

The Chair invited members to raise any questions.

Following a question regarding the number of days that traffic would be flowing through Kendal as a result of the Scheme, Members were informed that traffic management would be an issue and that it was not possible to provide key details of the impact at this stage. It was noted that when this information was available, it would be communicated to Members.

Members referred to the impact the Scheme would have and requested details of any actions to enhance Biodiversity and reduce the impact of the Scheme on Climate Change. It was highlighted that the aim of the Scheme was to not leave an imprint and that a plan would be put in place to enhance the environment in the area.

Details were requested on any plans to contribute to ensuring that areas such as Appleby Road would be in a good condition ahead of the increased traffic flow as a result of the Scheme. Members were informed that there was a strict budget but that if it was possible this would be considered. It was also noted that some areas would benefit from closures that would decrease traffic flowing from the M6 for some periods of time within the proposed timescales of the Scheme.

Members requested that the Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills be kept informed on the Caring for Cumbria proposal, particularly where apprenticeships and training were mentioned.

Following a query regarding biodiversity and offsetting CO2, Members were encouraged to email any ideas or helpful information to the scheme.

Members reiterated earlier concern for the impact of the Scheme on the traffic management within Kendal, particularly the potential impact on the elderly residents around Kendal who may rely on a Carer.

Members were informed of the reasons for replacing the bridges and were provided with the estimated life span of the planned replacements. It was requested that Grayrigg, New Hutton and Sedbergh Parish Councils all be kept up to date on the Scheme.

29. SAFE AND STRONG COMMUNITIES

The Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) introduced a report which set out information from across the Thriving Communities Teams, including community development, and provided an update on the work undertaken by three of the four working groups created by the Locality Board at its meeting held on 18 July 2023. Members were also given an update on current issues and an overview of the Locality Board budget position.

The Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) informed Members of an amendment to the wording of paragraph 3.1 in the report which read as below

These budget lines respectively 'Building Community Assets' and 'Climate Action and Biodiversity' to be administered in accordance with the criteria regarding Community Grants agreed by Cabinet at its meeting of the 12th September 2023 **OR** the terms of the Officer Decision Record (ODR) of August 2023 regarding the Priority Investment Fund, Strong and Connected Communities Programme (Appendix VI - to follow).

The Chair then invited the three Working Group Chairs to provide an update on the work undertaken in the initial meetings.

The Chair of the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group informed Members that the Working Group had discussed the two devolved budgets, which related to Building Community Assets and Local Sustainable Travel and Transport. Members were informed of the issues considered, as set out in the Action Notes of the meeting which were attached at Appendix II to the report.

The Chair of the Children and Young People Working Group informed Members that the Working Group had received a written report on the Children's Public Health Team and a verbal update from the Youth Council/ Youth Parliament and Early Years Service. Members of the Working Group also discussed the role of Elected Members as Corporate Parents and considered access to youth work. A number of grant submissions had been considered with respect to the two devolved budgets as set out in the Action Notes of the meeting which were attached at Appendix I to the report. Members also highlighted discussions around changes to the terminology used in the Terms of Reference and other documents relating to children and young people, Members had been requested to use "cared for children" and "care experienced" in the future.

The Chair of the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working Group recognised the positive step the South Lakeland Locality Board had taken in recognising Climate Change and Biodiversity loss as a priority of the Locality Board and commented that across the Westmorland and Furness area there should be equity in the approach of Members and Officers. He noted that communication was key regarding potential funding opportunities and that several actions were raised at the Working Group which he looked forward to updating on. The Action Notes of the Working Group were attached at Appendix III to the report.

Members were reminded of and encouraged to attend the ongoing consultation on the Climate Change Action Plan, which in part was being conducted through a series of Climate Conversations across the Westmorland and Furness area.

The Chair proposed that members consider the recommendations in the following order:-

- Recommendations at paragraph 2.1 to 2.6 and 2.9 to 2.10 in the report
- Recommendation at paragraph 2.7 in the report
- Recommendation 2.8

A motion to approve recommendations 2.1 to 2.6 and 2.9 to 2.10 was proposed and seconded.

Members expressed their support for the recommendations and information set out in the report, which would provide support for households across the South Lakeland Area and noted their concern regarding funding from central government.

A vote was taken and Members unanimously approved recommendations set out at 2.1 to 2.6 and 2.9 to 2.10.

Regarding the recommendation set out in 2.7, Members were asked to consider the funding report set out in Appendix IV, relating to Destination Hawkshead.

A proposal was received to grant an award of £16,620 to Hawkshead Parish Council from the Building Community Assets Budget and was seconded.

The seconder then withdrew his seconding of the motion.

The Chair requested an alternative proposal from members.

Members requested clarity on the figures in the application to ensure that they represented good value for money.

Following a request from Members the Chair clarified that if members were minded to defer the decision to enable the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group to consider the proposal, the next meeting of the Locality Board was scheduled for January 2024.

An alternative motion was proposed as follows:-

To delegated authority to the Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) in consultation with the Chair of the South Lakeland Locality Board and the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group to consider the grant application from Hawkshead Parish Council and to make a decision.

The motion was seconded.

Members expressed their strong support for the proposal and noted the need to ensure that the criteria for success and any lessons learnt were set out if the funding was to be approved.

A vote was taken and the recommendation was approved.

Members were asked to consider recommendations 2.8 (i) and (ii) as follows:-

- 2.8 (i) Agree to the establishment of a Community Transport Grants Panel to award grants (including bus grants) to community transport providers. The Director of Thriving Places in consultation with the Chair of the Locality Board is given the delegated authority to determine the relevant schemes and criteria to distribute the investment for community transport grant awards
- 2.8 (ii) If 2.8(i) is agreed, to nominate five members to form this Community Transport Panel as described in (paragraph 3.7 of the report).

Following a query on the total budget the panel would have if members were minded to approve, Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) explained that the Locality Board could decide the amount to allocate to the panel. The Cabinet Member for Highways and Assets clarified that the legislation around Community Transport was complicated and that where members had projects that should be put forward to the panel, discussions with officers would take place.

A motion to agree the amended recommendation at 2.8 (i) was proposed and seconded, a vote was taken and it was unanimously approved.

Members were then asked to nominate five members to the Community Transport Panel as set out at 2.8 (ii). Councillors M Brereton, R Audland, V Hughes, E Hennessy and I Mitchell were nominated.

A motion to agree the five nominated members was proposed and seconded. A vote was taken and it was unanimously approved.

RESOLVED, that:-

- (1) the award of £15,500 from the 0-19 budget to Brathay Trust be approved, to cover the essential delivery costs required to maintain the various delivery strands of the Youth Matters project in Year 2 for the reasons set out in the report;
- (2) it be noted that the following grant awards from the 0-19 budget and the 11-19 universal services budget that have been made under the delegation from the Locality Board on 18 July 2023 to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair Vice Chair and the relevant ward members and in accordance with the criteria in the Cabinet Guidance agreed by Shadow Cabinet in February 2023:
 - £4,470 from the 11-19 universal services budget to Youth Presence for open access youth provision in Kendal
 - £2,436 from the 0-19 budget to Bowness & Windermere Community Care Trust to contribute to a pilot project with primary school children to address the gap in literary education due to COVID, using Comic Art.
 - £4000 from the 0-19 budget to Cumbria Youth Alliance for the delivery of the Dreamscheme project in South Lakeland.
- (3) decisions on grant awards up to £5,000, in respect of the South Lakeland Building Community Assets Budget (to be administered as set out in this report) be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequality Working group the Chair and Vice Chair of the South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Members;

- (4) decisions on grant awards up to £5,000 in respect of the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity budget (to be administered as set out in this report) be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working group the Chair and Vice Chair of South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s;
- (5) the award of £30,000 from the devolved Department of Work & Pensions (DWP) Household Support Fund (HSF) to Action for Children be approved for the reasons set out in this report;
- (6) decisions on grant awards up to £5,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund (to be administered in accordance with the DWP criteria for that funding) be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s;
- (7) The Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) in consultation with the Chair of the South Lakeland Locality Board and the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group be delegated authority to consider the grant application from Hawkshead Parish Council and to make a decision.
- (8)
- (i) the establishment of a Community Transport Grants Panel to award grants (including bus grants) to community transport providers be agreed and that delegated authority be given to the Director of Thriving Places in consultation with the Chair of the Locality Board to determine the relevant schemes and criteria to distribute the investment for community transport grant awards; and
- (ii) the following members form the Community Transport Grants Panel as described in 3.7:-

- (9) in respect of the full Community Grant fund, decision making be delegated in relation to grant awards of up to £5,000 per award to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair, Vice Chair and relevant ward members, in accordance with the Community Grant Scheme Guidance approved by Cabinet on 12 September 2023, for the reasons set out in paragraph 3.8; and
- (10) the Summary Budget Position as set out in Appendix V be noted.

30. HIGHWAYS WORKING GROUP REPORT

The Area Highway Network Manager introduced a report which set out the Action Notes of the Highways Working Group (the Working Group), held on 13 September 2023.

Members were provided with details of the Action Notes as attached at Appendix 1 to the report.

The Chair invited Councillor R Audland, the Chair of the Working Group to provide an update on the work done by members at the first two meetings.

Members were informed that the two meetings had set the scene for the work done by the Working Group and had provided valuable discussion.

It was requested that the papers for the Working Group be shared to all Members as it would provide useful information and avoid repetition of questions to officers. A further request for training on Traffic Regulation Orders for Town and Parish Councils was made.

Members reiterated the Chair of the Working Group's comments and thanked officers for an informative meeting.

RESOLVED, that the Actions Notes of the Working Group meeting of 13 September 2023 at Appendix 1 to the report be noted.

31. BRIDGE RESTRICTIONS TRAFFIC REGULATION ORDER - HIGH CUNSEY AND RIGMADEN

The Traffic Management Team Leader introduced a report, which set out the responses to the statutory consultation and advertising of the Order as set out in the report.

The Council had been requested by the Bridges and Structures Team to consult upon weight and traffic restrictions for High Cunsey and Rigmaden Bridges respectively within the South Lakeland Area. Full details of the proposal were set out in the report and attached appendices.

The report included:-

- the statutory notice used for advertising and consultation as attached at Appendix 1 to the report;
- plans as attached at Appendices 2a and 2b to the report;
- the Councils' statement of reason for proposing to make the order as attached at Appendix 3 to the reports; and
- a summary of responses to the consultation, as set out at Appendix 4 to the report (Appendix 4 had been circulated as a late document to all members of the Locality Board).

Members expressed their support for the proposals and noted that it was important that diversion routes were clearly set out. It was highlighted how important repairing both bridges was, as large detours would increase carbon emissions and travel time.

Officers and the Cabinet Member for Highways and Assets were thanked for their hard work and leadership in ensuring the repairs were completed.

A motion to approve the recommendation as set out in the report was proposed and seconded. A vote was taken and it was

RESOLVED, that, having taken into account the representations, which were received during the statutory consultation and advertisement and having also taken into consideration the matters contained in Section 122(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, which are more specifically referred to at paragraph 8.1 of the Report, the Westmorland and Furness Council (C5028 High Cunsey, near Far Sawrey) (Prohibition of Heavy Commercial Vehicles over 7.5 Tonnes Maximum Gross Vehicle Weight) and (C5080 Rigmaden Bridge, near Barbon) (Prohibition of All Traffic) Order 202>< ("the Order") be approved and be brought into operation as advertised.

32. LOCAL SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT FUND

The Senior Manager – Safe and Strong Communities introduced a report, which presented Members with a list of schemes which the South Lakeland Locality Board – Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group had recommended approving to utilise the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund (the Fund) allocation.

The report set out the funding for the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund, as agreed by Cabinet at its 6 June 2023 meeting as well as the process and funding delegations for considering any bids from relevant groups which would be submitted to a South Lakeland Community Transport Grants Panel for approval. Members were being asked to endorse the first phase of schemes as attached at Appendix 1 to the report, which had been presented to the South Lakeland Locality Board Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group.

Members were informed of a bid to the Fund from the Friends of the X112 Community Group for a grant of \pounds 5,000 to support the operational costs of this community run service until March 2024 with an additional request being considered by the Furness Locality Board for support of £1,750, which reflected the passenger usage in the locality.

Following a query from Members, the Senior Manager (Safe and Strong Communities) provided clarity on the progress on the list of issues raised by Members during the 'walk the ward' sessions. He informed Members that the list had been disaggregated across the different areas of the Council to assign them to the most appropriate area and that the organised list of proposals would be bought to the December Working Groups.

Note - Cllr I Mitchell left the meeting at 19.50

Members welcomed the inclusion of the list of schemes at Appendix 1 and commented on the positive impact that the schemes would have when implemented across the South Lakeland area. It was noted that Town and Parish Councils could provide valuable knowledge on their local areas and would be keen to take an interest in any future works.

Following a request from Members, the Chair requested that officers share the list of issues raised in the 'walk the ward' sessions. It was also noted that Members would have the opportunity to put any further ideas forwards.

A motion to approve the recommendation in the report was proposed and seconded. A vote was taken and it was

RESOLVED, that the Director of Thriving Places, in consultation with the Chair of the Locality Board be recommended to agree the list of recommended schemes to utilise the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport fund, as outlined in Appendix 1 to the report.

33. APPOINTMENT TO OUTSIDE BODIES

The Legal, Governance and Democracy Senior Specialist (Solicitor) introduced the report and noted that the Council had been approached by Ulverston Business Improvement District (BID) to request that an appointment be made to the Ulverston BID by the South Lakeland Locality Board.

Councillor V Hughes nominated Councillor H Irving as the representative on Ulverston BID and was seconded by Councillor M Brereton.

No further nominations were received/ repeat as above.

RESOLVED, that Councillor H Irving be appointed as the Council's representative on Ulverston BID.

34. OUTSIDE BODIES

Members provided verbal updates following Outside Body meetings they had attended.

Feedback on the Council's Armed Forces Board, the Climate Conversation held in Barrow, the Brewery Arts Centre Trust and the National Park Authority were received.

Members requested that communication on the functions of the Locality Board be circulated to residents and community groups to ensure that they were aware of the work done and opportunities provided by the Locality Board.

Following a query raised by Members, the Legal, Governance and Democracy Senior Specialist (Solicitor) provided an update on a request from members at the last meeting of the Locality Board for further information on the role of members who had been appointed to Outside Bodies. Members were informed that this was an ongoing process and that an update had been circulated to all members of the Locality Board with information that had been provided by the Outside and Other Bodies.

35. URGENT ITEMS

There were no Urgent Items for consideration.

1. Executive Summary

- 1.1 The Safe and Strong Communities report brings together information from across the thriving community teams including community development. This report provides the South Lakeland Locality Board with an update on the work undertaken in Locality Board priority areas as reflected by the Board's attendant Working Groups, namely:
 - Children and Young People Working Group
 - Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group
 - Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working Group

In addition, the report provides an opportunity to highlight current issues and gives an overview of the Locality Board budget position.

3 Information: The Rationale and Evidence

South Lakeland Locality Board priorities 2023/24

3.1 At the meeting of the South Lakeland Locality Board held on the 18th of July 2023 members resolved to form four Working Groups reflecting the local priorities identified following workshops held in May and June. These Working Groups to be focused on Children and Young People, Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities, Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity, and Highways. At this meeting the Locality Board agreed to combine the Priority Investment Fund Project monies attendant to the Strong and Connected Communities Programmed devolved to the Locality Board with General Provisions funding to create two budget lines upon which the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group and the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working Group would advise the Locality Board regarding spend. These budget lines respectively 'Building' Community Assets' and 'Climate Action and Biodiversity' to be administered as appropriate in accordance with the criteria regarding Community Grants agreed by Cabinet at its meeting of the 12th of September 2023 and/or the terms of the Officer Decision Record (ODR) of August 2023 regarding the Priority Investment Fund, Strong and Connected Communities Programme (Appendix VI, Safe & Strong Communities Report, South Lakeland Locality Board Meeting 18th October 2023).

3.2 Children and Young People Working Group.

- 3.2.1 The Children and Young People Working group met on the 11th of December 2023 (Action Notes are provided at Appendix I). The Working Group received a verbal report with respect to the Children in Care Council and Care Experienced Young People including an update on activities which have taken place recently and are due to take place in coming months. Em Fenton (Deputy Member of Youth Parliament) attended the meeting and gave an overview of her role. A verbal update on the changes to the Public Health nurses' team was provided.
- 3.2.2 At its meeting on the 18th of July the South Lakeland Locality Board agreed that decisions on grant awards up to £5,000 from the 0-19 budget and the 11-19 universal services budget be delegated to the Senior Manager, Safe and Strong Communities, in consultation with the Chair, Vice Chair and the relevant ward Members provided that these are in accordance with the criteria in the Cabinet Guidance agreed by Shadow Cabinet in February 2023. (Ref: Westmorland and Furness Council South Lakeland Locality Board, meeting 18th July 2023, Minutes sec. 19 (7)). Accordingly, the Locality Board is recommended to approve the award of £10,000 from the 11-19 Universal Youth Services budget to Levens Playing Fields for refurbishment of playing fields in Levens, approve the award of £10,000 from the 0-19 budget to St John's Hospice to support the delivery of Bereavement Support Services for Children and Young People, approve the award of £8,870 from the 0-19 budget to Comic Arts to support the Manga Mash Up Library Project in Kendal

Library and approve the award of £12,500 from the 0-19 budget to the Kent Estuary Youth Project to support the Life & Community Skills Project.

This is deemed to be consistent with the conditions agreed by the Locality Board at its meeting on the 18th of July 2023, namely that projects address at least one of the following criteria:

- Provide access to play, recreational, leisure or outdoor activities.
- Provide access to care or educational activities.
- Provide access to safe and enjoyable places for children and young people to go.
- Provide access to holiday, weekend or out of school activities.
- Enable children and young people's involvement and participation e.g. forum, youth council, engagement, empowerment, decision-making.
- Support children and young people to take part in volunteering or community action.
- 3.2.3 The Board is also asked to note the awards that have been made under the delegation to the Senior Manager, Safe and Strong Communities agreed on the 18th of July 2023 meeting:
 - The award of £4,950 from the 0-19 budget to Youth Presence to support a year 6 transition project.
 - The award of £905 from the 0-19 budget to Action for Children to provide hygiene products at each children's centre.
 - The award of £4,500 from the 0-19 budget to Ambleside Parish Centre to contribute to projects for children and young people.
 - The award of £4,284 from the 0-19 budget to Greenwich Leisure Ltd to support 10p swims for children and young people.

3.3 Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group.

3.3.1 The Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group met on the 6th of December 2023 (Action Notes are provided at Appendix II). The Working Group considered a presentation from Jade Gibson of Community Catalysts updated members on current activity commissioned by Westmorland and Furness Council to provide free advice and information to caring support businesses in Barrow, South Lakeland and Eden. Lois Sparling provided an update on the work of the South Lakeland Poverty Truth Commission. Items attendant to the Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund are addressed in the accompanying paper. 3.3.2 At its meeting on the 18th of October 2023 the Locality Board agreed that awards up to £5,000, in respect of the South Lakeland Building Community Assets Budget be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequality Working group the Chair and Vice Chair of the South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s (Ref: Westmorland and Furness Council South Lakeland Locality Board, meeting 18th October 2023, Minutes sec. 29 (3)). Accordingly the Locality Board is recommended to approve the award of £15,000 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to Stricklandgate House Trust to support preliminary phase of proposed large scale building refurbishment and redevelopment (this in conjunction with £10,000 from the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Budget), approve the award of £8,000 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to Waste into Wellbeing to support installation of an accessible toilet (this in conjunction with £5,000 from the Community Grants Fund), approve the award of £7,000 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to Ambleside Parish Centre (Community Hub) towards Centre costs and approve the award of £6,500 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to Arnside Sailing Club to support building changing facilities and a meeting room in the boat house.

This is deemed to be consistent with the priorities agreed by the Locality Board at its meeting on the 18th of July 2023, namely that projects contribute to at least one of the following:

- Building Community Assets.
- Enabling communities to reduce inequalities.
- Enabling communities to build opportunity.
- Enabling communities to achieve greater independence.
- 3.3.3 The Board is also asked to note the awards that have been made under the delegation to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities agreed on the 18th of October 2023 meeting:
 - The award of £4,000 from the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities budget to Inspira to provide catering to support return to work courses.
 - The award of £3,350 from the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities budget to Burton Memorial Hall for a feasibility survey to assess suitability of solar panels.

- The award of £2,110 from the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities budget to Kirkby Lonsdale & Lune Valley Community Interest Company to Support the Annual Christmas Fair.
- The award of £748 from the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities budget to Levens Methodist Church towards costs for a winter warm spot.

3.4 **Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working Group.**

- 3.4.1 The Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Working Group met on the 13th of December (Action Notes are provided at Appendix III). The Working Group received a presentation from Cumbria Wildlife Trust on the Pollinator Programmes in Cumbria, including the 23/24 Planting for Pollinators which has included 7 sites in South Lakeland and a presentation on the Home Upgrade Grants 2 scheme being delivered by W&F Council to provide energy efficiency upgrades and low-carbon heating for households earning up to £31,000 a year living in the least energy efficient, off-gas grid homes. The group was advised that the previous South Lakeland District Council Biodiversity Toolkit has been rebranded and updated as requested at the last meeting.
- 3.4.2 At its meeting on the 18th of October 2023 the Locality Board agreed that awards up to £5,000, in respect of the South Lakeland Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Budget be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequality Working group the Chair and Vice Chair of the South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s (Ref: Westmorland and Furness Council South Lakeland Locality Board, meeting 18th October 2023, Minutes sec. 29 (4)). Accordingly the Locality Board is recommended to approve the award of £35,000 to Cumbria Wildlife Trust from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to support continuation of the Planting for Pollinators Project, approve the award of £15,000 to Waste into Wellbeing from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to support Phase 1 development of a new climate hub/food waste project and approve the award of £15,000 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme) to Stricklandgate House Trust to support preliminary phase of proposed large scale building refurbishment and redevelopment (this in conjunction with £15,000 from the Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Budget).

This is deemed to be consistent with the priority agreed by the Locality Board at its meeting on the 18th of July 2023, namely:

- Caring for our climate and reducing our carbon footprint.
- 3.4.3 The Board is also asked to note the awards that have been made under the delegation to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities agreed on the 18th of October 2023 meeting:
 - The award of £400 from the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Budget to Sustainability & Energy Network in Staveley towards purchase of a bike trailer.
 - The award of £2,500 from the Climate Action and Increasing Biodiversity Budget to Cumbria Action for Sustainability to provide a small grants programme for groups to run Great Big Green Week events.

3.5 **Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund (HSF)**

- 3.5.1 At its meeting on the 18th of October 2023 the Locality Board agreed that award decisions on grant awards up to £5,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund (to be administered in accordance with the DWP criteria for that funding) be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s (Ref: Westmorland and Furness Council South Lakeland Locality Board, meeting 18th October 2023, Minutes sec. 29 (6)). Accordingly, the Board is asked to note:
 - The award of £5,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Manna House to assist people with household costs.
 - The award of £2,130 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Outside In Cumbria to provide a Tuesday evening session offering a warm place to eat and drink for families.
 - The award of £3,980 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Kirkby Lonsdale Community Cupboard to support the Winter 2023 warm spaces project.
 - The award of £2,660 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Cartmel Peninsula Holiday Boxes towards the cost of food boxes.
 - The award of £5,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Grange-over-Sands Community Lunch/Foodshare to assist people with household costs.

- The award of £2,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Milnthorpe Area Food Bank towards the cost of providing food parcels.
- The award of £3,500 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Sandylands Residents Association to support with weekly FoodShare costs.
- The award of £3,180 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Ambleside Parish Centre towards the running of a weekly food club.
- The award of £4,950 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Windermere & District Foodbank to assist people with household costs.

- The award of £3,600 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Kendal Food Club to support the running costs of the food club.
- The award of £2,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Zero Waste Sedbergh Community Interest Company to assist people with household costs.
- The award of £2,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Ulverston Food Waste Project to support FoodShare and warm spot costs.
- The award of £5,000 from the Department of Work and Pensions Household Support Fund to Kirkbarrow Residents Association to assist people with household costs.

3.6 Community Grants

3.6.1 At its meeting on the 18th of October 2023 the Locality Board agreed that award decisions on grant awards up to £5,000 from the Community Grants Fund (to be administered in accordance with the Community Grant Scheme Guidance approved by Cabinet on 12 September 2023) be delegated to the Senior Manager Safe and Strong Communities in consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of South Lakeland Locality Board and the relevant ward Member/s (Ref: Westmorland and Furness Council South Lakeland Locality Board, meeting 18th October 2023, Minutes sec. 29 (9)). Accordingly, the Board is asked to note:

- The award of £5,000 from the Community Grants Fund to Waste into Well Being towards the installation of an accessible toilet (this in conjunction with £8,000 from the Priority Investment Fund (Strong and Connected Communities Programme)).
- The award of £1,500 from the Community Grants Fund to the Kent Estuary Youth Project towards the purchase of a range of equipment
- The award of £1,450 from the Community Grants Fund to Pennington Parish Council towards repair works to a car park located in Loppergarth.
- The award of £900 from the Community Grants Fund to Sedbergh Allotments Association towards hedge laying at Sedbergh Community Allotments
- The award of £5,000 from the Community Grants Fund to St Johns Hospice towards the purchase of 2 items of specialist equipment for the in-patient ward.

3.7 South Lakeland Locality Board Plan

3.7.1 The South Lakeland Locality Board Draft Plan (Appendix IV) describes the Locality Board priorities, methods of working and aspirations. It supports Westmorland and Furness Council's vision, priorities and values. The Locality Board Plan priorities will be reviewed with local members annually to ensure the plan continues to reflect the concerns of the local community.

Members are recommended to approve the South Lakeland Locality Board Draft Plan.

3.8 Other Activity of Note

3.8.1 Locality Board Additional Meetings:

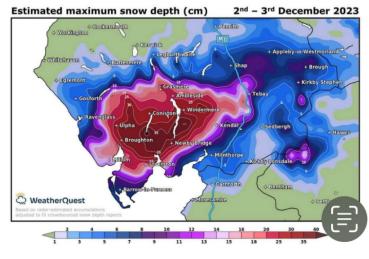
In addition to quarterly meetings and meetings of working groups the Locality Board has the opportunity to request additional meetings to consider topics of interest. Since the Board last met in October 2023 members have had the opportunity to attend meetings considering the following;

- The Westmorland & Furness Council Climate and Nature Partnership Fund
- The UK Shared Prosperity Fund
- Community and School Transport

- The Community Safety Partnership
- Winter Preparedness

3.8.2 Snow:

Saturday the 3rd of December saw very heavy and unexpected snow fall across a large part of South Lakeland. A number of events had drawn visitors to the area and many people were unable to return home due to impassable roads. Along with the police, mountain rescue and other partners



Westmorland and Furness Council mobilised a significant response from



across the organisation, to work on opening roads, supporting the co-ordination of the emergency response etc. Many of these staff were not on-call but once contacted worked through the weekend to support local communities and stranded visitors.

The South Lakeland communities team worked through the weekend to identify and support community groups that were contributing to the effort and to glean situational awareness from contacts 'on the ground.' A number of community facilities (along with businesses) opened their doors for people stranded overnight providing shelter, warmth food and drink in an exemplary community effort. The communities' team are working to ensure community groups and community centres that used their resources to provide food and drinks etc. are not financially disadvantaged by their efforts.

3.8.3 Farm Visit:

The concerns of our local farming community, the contribution that community makes to the local area and the challenges those in farming face are of great



interest not only to Westmorland and Furness Council but to many partner organisations most notably those working in health care.

At the end of November Cllr Pender generously facilitated an opportunity for council officers interested in biodiversity,

rural poverty, and the rural economy along colleagues from primary care with an interest in physical and mental health could explore these issues in situ during a visit to an upland farm. Thankfully the weather, along with the setting, was beautiful as was the home baked lemon cake!

3.8.4 South Lakeland Community Health, Wellbeing and Equity Partnership:

Early in December Katrina Stephens, The Director of Public Health for Westmorland and Furness, lead a workshop to consider how best the Public Health agenda might be progressed across South Lakeland.



Those invited included the relevant portfolio holders, the chair of the Locality Board and its' working groups, representatives from other statutory and voluntary partner organisations. As the South Lakeland locality board has a member working group (Building Communities Assets and Addressing Inequality) that considers many of the issues attendant to the Public Health agenda considerable thought was given to what an additional form might offer and how it might best be organised. Further work continues on an appropriate local model which it is anticipated will be agreed in the coming months.

4. Link to Council Plan Priorities: (People, Climate, Communities, Economy and Culture, Customers, Workforce)

1. South Lakeland Locality Board has a key role in local community leadership, it is ideally placed to progress the Council Plan priorities through enabling collaborative local working across the priority themes. Close working with partner organisations and communities ensures that the interventions undertaken to address these priorities are relevant to our population and that local people are at the heart of council delivery.

2. The priorities of the South Lakeland Locality Board compliment those of the Council as a whole; the work of the Locality Broad brings both additionality and emphasis that reflects the particular circumstances of the area.

3. Having now established Working Groups aligned to the agreed local priorities the South Lakeland Locality Board is now equipped with a decision making infrastructure which will enable considered and effective progress with respect these priorities.

4. The proposed South Lakeland Locality Board Plan provides explicit coherence between the work of the Locality Board and the Council Plan priorities. If adopted it offers a strong platform for local decision making that progresses corporate objectives in a manner sympathetic to local circumstances.

5. Consultation Outcomes (with services, ward councillors & public consultation where required

7. Financial Implications and risk

7.1 The Locality Board currently has unallocated resources in its budget totalling £198,315, which includes decisions made at previous meetings and grants of

up to £5,000 made under the agreed delegated authority contained in this report, with a breakdown of the budget headings shown in Appendix 5 to the report.

7.2 Recommendations for approval by the Locality Board in this report total £137,870 and these are summarised in Appendix 5. Should all these recommendations be approved, £137,870 will be committed from the budget, leaving unallocated resources of £60,445 available for future allocation.

8. Legal & Governance Implications

- 8.1 The Locality Boards Terms of Reference within the Constitution at Part 2 Section 5 include: the power to allocate funding grants within the terms of a Community Grants Scheme to be developed by the Cabinet, and allocation of discretionary budgets, making decisions and developing activities in supporting locality working, projects and activities within the terms of any scheme that may be developed by the Cabinet.
- 8.2 Locality Board members must satisfy themselves that the proposals to distribute grants are being made in accordance with agreed criteria to ensure consistency and transparency across the process. Due weight must be given in terms of equalities duties and fairness. Should the Council distribute funds not in accordance with these principles, then it could be at risk of legal challenge.
- 8.3 Grant awards should be made subject to appropriate terms and conditions and with regard to the Council's Finance Procedure Rules. Members of the Locality Board will need to satisfy themselves that the proposed grant awards are being determined in accordance with criteria.
- 8.4 The Council is under a legal obligation to comply with the Subsidy Control Act 2022. Decisions of the Council may be challenged by judicial review if the subsidy control rules are not followed or not followed completely. Grants or other measures may be suspended, and orders for damages or recovery of any unlawful subsidy made. The Council may suffer reputational damage if an unlawful subsidy is made.

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South Lakeland Locality Board Plan

Introduction

Westmorland and Furness Council has three Locality Boards: Eden, Furness and South Lakeland.

Each Locality Board promotes close working with our communities, making sure local voices are heard when we are developing our services and policies. In addition, they work with residents and community groups on issues that are important to their area.

The three Locality Boards are based on the geographical boundaries of the former District Councils and are made up of the Councillors who have been elected in each particular area. Locality Boards have some decision making powers and budgets, as well as the ability to influence and engage with matters which affect their locality.

Locality Boards have a range of responsibilities which are delivered under the themes below:

- Undertake a community leadership role, bringing together different interest groups from the public, private and voluntary sectors to work in partnership.
- Understand and influence the delivery of Council services to ensure this reflects local need.
- Allocation of funding and grants to support locality working, projects and activities.
- Support the local delivery of the Council Highways Service.

Each Locality Board's Locality Plan sets out its priorities based on local issues and opportunities while supporting Westmorland and Furness Council's vision, priorities and values.





The Place Plan priorities will be reviewed annually to ensure they reflect community need.

Foreword

We live in one of the most beautiful places in the country. From the world famous Lake District to the underrated coastline which is equally magnificent in its own way with its myriad estuaries.

Many people have strong local roots and immense pride in the place where they were born and raised, whether that be one of the market towns, outlying villages and farms. People who have come here to work or as retirees truly appreciate the magical surroundings of where they live.

There is also a strong sense of community, evidenced by the extraordinary response to the pandemic where everyone pulled together to help out the most vulnerable and continue to do so for both residents and visitors alike during past and recent weather events.

However, there are challenges. A relatively high cost of living is not matched by a local economy where salaries are relatively low so young people increasingly can't afford to live and raise their families here. As with many rural areas, public transport and access to services, especially for the elderly who no longer drive, is problematic.

The South Lakeland Board is Westmorland and Furness Council's link to the people and organisations of the area. We are here to represent the local voice in how we develop our services and policies. We are also here to help fund local initiatives that are important to local communities.

Funding isn't of course unlimited, so we have had to call out priorities and the ones we have focused on this year are children and young people, building community assets and addressing inequalities, protecting our natural landscape from the impacts of climate change and biodiversity loss, sustainable travel and transport.

The Locality Plan describes how we intend to work for and with our local residents and local organisations to help ensure that South Lakeland is a place where everyone can live, work and thrive and that we continue to protect its natural beauty for everyone to enjoy, both residents and visitors alike.

I look forward very much to working with you all and welcome any feedback you may have.

About South Lakeland

POPULATION:

Unlike the population of England, which has increased by 6.6% in the past decade, the population of South Lakeland has increased by just 0.8% from 2011, to around 104,500. This represents 46% of the residents of Westmorland and Furness Council

South Lakeland has an ageing population with over a quarter of residents aged 65yrs or older. The proportion of the population aged 65yrs or older has increased dramatically in the past decade while the working age and child/young person population has fallen.

ECONOMY & CULTURE:

Accommodation & Food Services and Wholesale & Retail are the two largest employment sectors in South Lakeland. Gross median annual full time earnings for employments based in South Lakeland (£28,502) are the lowest of the three locality board areas (Eden, £29,523; Furness £34,802).

South Lakeland boasts an internationally recognised cultural offer, from its connexions with Wordsworth, Ruskin, Stan Laurel and Beatrix Potter to Grizedale Arts in Coniston and Brewery Arts in Kendal. The Lake District National Park alone attracts over 15 million visitors a year. With additional visitors to the Yorkshire Dales National Park (which includes part of South Lakeland) and villages outside the national parks such as Arnside, Cartmel and Grange-over-Sands the area, which has 4 Michelin starred restaurants, has some 11,500 local jobs directly associated with leisure industries.

HEALTH & WELLBEING:

Life expectancy at birth in South Lakeland (female, 84·8yrs; male 80·3yrs) is higher than that for England as a whole. Within South Lakeland there are significant differences in life expectancy for those born into our most deprived and least deprived communities; on average those in our most deprived areas die more than 4 years earlier than those in our most affluent areas and spend nearly 10 more years at the end of these shorter lives in poor health than those in our most advantaged areas.

HOUSING:

There are approximately 53,800 dwellings in South Lakeland of which 29.5% are estimated not to meet the decent homes standard; South Lakeland has among the highest proportion of non-decent housing in the country.

There are a relatively high proportion of homes that are owned. The ratio of socially rented dwellings to privately rented is relatively low. The percentage of local dwellings in council tax bands A and B is low compared with that for England and there are a relatively high proportion of homes in bands G and H.

CLIMATE CHANGE:

The geography and topography of South Lakeland result in a varied climate. In coastal towns such as Ulverston, in the high fells and in more inland Sedbergh temperature and precipitation reflect the particular circumstances of place and daily weather as well as climate differ considerably. In recent years climatic events such as Storms Desmond (2015) and Arwen (2021) along with very localised heavy rains Ulverston (September 2023) have resulted in considerable distress to local communities and understandably have exacerbated anxieties around climate change.

A 2020 report 'A Carbon Baseline for Cumbria' identifies transport, industrial & commercial fuel use and domestic energy as the largest local contributors to Carbon Dioxide (CO₂) emissions with local per capita production-based emissions greater than that for England as a whole.

COMMUNITY:

With over 70 town councils, parish councils and parish meetings the geographical communities in South Lakeland vary from super-rural, to hamlets, villages and market towns.

97.7% of the population identify as white with 94.7% having one or more UK identity only. Over half the population consider themselves to be Christian with the next largest group reporting having no religion, minority faiths account for only about 1% of the local population. 2.27% of the

population over 16yrs identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, or other (LGB+), 90·77% as straight or heterosexual.

Appendix IV

Local communities are generally very cohesive and resilient as demonstrated during the COVID pandemic. However, as is common in rural areas, minority and vulnerable groups (LGB+, those with mental health problems, people with disability, minority faith groups etc.) can feel isolated with limited opportunity to connect to peers and, when looking to access services or support, frequently express concern about lack of anonymity. Access to services, post 16 education and recreation can be challenging and expensive, many young people migrate out of the area.

The challenges we face.

For the majority of local residents South Lakeland is a wonderful place to live. The beautiful natural environment, low crime rates and a strong sense of community make it attractive, notably to those in retirement. Over time these strengths have contributed to the development of a local socio-economic structure which presents sustainability challenges.

The local economy is relatively low paying, the ratio of local house prices to local salaries makes it difficult for the average local worker to afford local housing. Many local residents who are working are employed in better paying sectors located in Barrow, Lancaster or Copeland with local employers often recruiting from surrounding areas with lower housing costs. The resultant daily migration of workers into and out from the area contributes to the local carbon footprint. Increasing the availability of affordable local housing is a challenge but provides an opportunity to rebalance the local economy, improve housing stock and reduce the local carbon footprint.

Access to goods and services can be challenging. For those living in more rural parts with limited financial means, food, fuel and transport costs can be relatively high; a function of a lack of nearby low cost food retailers, reliance on oil or solid fuel for domestic heating of houses that are often energy inefficient and the need to maintain a vehicle given the limitations of local public transport. For those with health and care needs access to services can be problematic; an aging population increases the need for social care, however the small local workforce and relatively low pay for care workers limits availability. Furthermore, travel distances and times to secondary and tertiary health care settings are far greater than for those in, or close to, major urban conurbations. Many local young people have limited ability to access education and training, vulnerable and minority groups limited access to people with shared life experience. Mobilising our community assets through volunteering and local engagement, partnership working (particularly with those in health care), improving our digital infrastructure & digital literacy, embracing innovation in communication and taking action to address wider determinants of health are all measures which can mitigate these challenges.

A very attractive visitor offer means the area sees huge tourist numbers. In the most popular places this frequently results in traffic problems. Public transport is limited and there is a tension between maintaining the unique features of the area and major transport infrastructure development. More even distribution of the visitor footfall across the area is both a challenge and an opportunity.

The general affluence of South Lakeland tends to mask areas of significant concern. Geographically constructed measures of deprivation overlook small numbers of households in affluent areas facing challenges from poverty to poor housing and, in rural areas, challenges of access and loneliness. Working closely (at a granular level) with our local community groups, effective collaboration with parish & town councils, supporting our community infrastructure (both physical and social), and targeting resources at individuals and households rather than by geography all present opportunities to address local inequality thus improving the health, wellbeing and life chances for those most vulnerable and increasing a sense of community cohesion and harmony for all.

South Lakeland Locality Board Plan Priorities

From March 2023 a series of workshops led by the Area Manager were held with local members. Input from officers representing Public Health, Highways, Children's Services, Community Development etc. was included and members were invited to consider both quantitative and qualitative data relevant to South Lakeland. From these workshops and subsequent discussions members agreed two themes that should cut across the work of the locality board;

Theme 1: Supporting and empowering our communities across South Lakeland to build the places they are proud of.

Theme 2: Promoting health and wellbeing across the life-course.

At its meeting in July 2023 the Locality Board agreed to the formation of four working groups to consider issues attendant to the priorities for action that had emerged;

Priority 1: Children & Young People: ensuring that our young people have the best start in life and are supported to achieve their full potential.

Priority 2: Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities: enabling communities to reduce inequalities, build opportunity and achieve greater independence.

Priority 3: Climate Action: caring for our climate and reducing our carbon footprint.

Priority 4: Highways: supporting a safe and effective highways network.

Delivery

South Lakeland Locality Board will work with partners and utilise Council funding to support the delivery of the priorities described above.

Member working groups have been formed as described above. Groups meet quarterly (ahead of meetings of the Locality Board) and may also call occasional meetings to consider any urgent matter or to explore a subject of interest. The working groups may draw in officers of the council or third parties with particular expertise to assist them in their deliberations. The core membership of these working groups was agreed by the Locality Board at its meeting in July 2023, all core members are elected members of Westmorland and Furness Council. Where working groups are considering making recommendation to the Locality Board a majority vote of core members is required. Elected members who are not core members of working groups may attend and may contribute to meetings, they may not (unless deputised by a core member) vote on any motion

under consideration. Working groups advise the Locality Board on spend devolved to the Board, they are not decision making bodies.

Delivery of the Place Plan priorities will be linked to both the Council Plan Delivery Framework and the Council's Target Operating Model to both support and influence the delivery of projects and services to best benefit the local area.

Westmorland and Furness Council Plan Delivery Framework

The Framework provides information about what the Council plans to deliver and how it will work with communities and partners to ensure Westmorland and Furness is a great place to live, work and thrive.

The Framework identifies ten strategic delivery themes, bringing these together with the Council's vision and the six strategic priorities, with three sustainability principles of equity, economy and environment.



Westmorland and Furness Target Operating Model

An operating model helps us plan and deliver activities, projects and programmes that will support the priorities we have as a Council.

The Westmorland and Furness target operating model has been designed with a focus on early intervention and improving the customer experience.

Community focus	We will focus on early intervention and prevention, working with individuals, community groups, parish and town councils, the voluntary sector and partners to reduce need for our services and improve health and wellbeing.
Easy access	Services will be user friendly, caring and accessible through multiple channels. Wherever possible services will be available and delivered digitally, reducing demand for phone and in-person interaction so those resources can be focused to those most in need.
Effective services	Services are outcome focused and maximise use of technology to drive efficiency and effectiveness. Service delivery is citizen centred and seamless between services and partner organisations.
Enabling Processes	Internal processes and functions are designed to support a seamless end- to-end experience. Improvement and change is supported by key enabling functions including HR, Legal, PMO etc working closely with service delivery teams.
Supporting Technology	'Fit for purpose' technology across the Council that supports the delivery of services, promotes digital ways of working, and enables organisational efficiency.

What Success Looks Like

- A Locality Board that is a strong advocate within the council for South Lakeland communities, that contributes to and has influence in the development of council policy, and that helps progress an agenda which empowers local communities to have greater control in matters that affect them.
- Evidence of work with partners in the statutory and voluntary sectors to support the delivery of social care throughout the life-course, for children, young people, working age adults and older adults who need social support.
- Close working with parish councils, town councils and local partners across all sectors. Evidenced by ongoing and fruitful engagement with the Locality Board and its working groups.

Priority 1: Children & Young People

- Measurable effective local investment in schemes and projects that;
 - Provide opportunity for children and young people to broaden their life experience and enable them to achieve their aspirations; supporting them to make safe and sound decisions as they move into young adulthood.
 - Address issues attendant to child poverty.
 - Ensure those in their early years have the best start in life.
 - Local members actively engaged with supporting cared for and care experienced children and young people in their role as corporate parents (as corporate parents, it's every councillor's responsibility to make sure that the council is meeting it's duties towards children in care and care leavers as described in the Children and Social Work Act 2017).

Priority 2: Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities

- Measurable effective local investment in community activity and community infrastructure for the benefit of residents to;
 - Maintain and enhance physical and social infrastructure locally.
 - Support those most vulnerable and disadvantaged.
 - Promote community resilience (local groups actively supporting their communities).
 - Contribute to providing accessible and rewarding local employment.
 - Supports the local voluntary sector, ensuring it flourishes and continues to provide additionality to statutory services.
 - Maintaining and developing local art and sport as key community assets.
 - Encourage dispersal of visitors across the locality.
 - Enable and encourage social engagement and physical activity that supports the mental and physical wellbeing of residents throughout the course of their lives.

Priority 3: Climate Action

- Measurable effective local investment and collaboration with partners to;
 - Help facilitate large scale strategic infrastructure projects that encourage lower carbon lifestyle choices around travel, work and leisure.
 - Maintain, develop and promote use of our local network of footpaths, cycleways and bridleways to encourage active low carbon travel choices.
 - Raise awareness and understanding of issues attendant to climate action, enabling individuals and communities to act and make choices that contribute to mitigating climate change.
 - Support local communities and community groups with an interest in addressing climate change and promoting biodiversity.

Priority 4: Highways

- Measurable effective local investment, collaboration the Council's Highways & Transport Strategic Board and engagement with local communities to;
 - Maintain a safe local highway infrastructure.
 - Ensure the needs of all highway users are appropriately met.
 - Develop local traffic management schemes attendant to the needs of communities.
 - Support effective sustainable travel including public transport.
 - Support the resilience of the local network at times of stress (floods, snow etc)

The locality Board will develop a set of key measurables against which progress on its priorities can be assessed. An annual review of the Locality Board Plan will ensure it remains relevant and is an effective tool in improving local wellbeing.

3. Information: the Rationale and Evidence

- 3.1 The Working Group received the following presentations, which had been circulated to Members prior to the meeting, except for the Cadent Gas presentation;
 - The North-West Streetworks Manager for Cadent Gas delivered a PowerPoint presentation regarding the ongoing programme of cast iron gas main replacements, and particularly the works being undertaken in the South Lakes area in 2024/25. Cadent Gas and the Authority's highways and streetworks teams had met previously, and the plans provided by Cadent Gas at that meeting were circulated to Members in advance of the meeting.
 - The Local Area Network Manager delivered a PowerPoint presentation regarding the Authority's winter service and described how the Highway Service delivered the Authority's statutory duty.

- The Local Area Network Manager presented a paper informing Members how the Members ambitions that were captured during the "Walk the Wards" meetings in June and July 2023 had been considered and allocated to the appropriate team within the wider service. The spreadsheet attached to the paper detailed those revenue ambitions which the local area highway team had completed, those which had been actioned yet to be completed and those which still required action.

- The Traffic Management Manager presented a paper advising Members of Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) that will be presented to the South Lakeland Locality Board meeting in January. The TROs related to bridge weight restrictions, general parking restrictions and a TRO for Cartmel. The TROs are being considered as part of this meeting under other agenda items and therefore no recommendations are included in this paper in relation to these items.
- The Local Area Network Manager presented a paper informing Members of the impact of Storm Debi on the highway service and the response of the service.

1. Executive Summary

1.1 This report presents Members with a list of schemes which the South Lakeland Locality Board – Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group have recommended approving to utilise the remaining balance of the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund allocation.

2. Recommendation

For the reasons set out in this report, it is recommended that South Lakeland Locality Board -

2.1 recommend that the Director of Thriving Places in consultation with the Chair of the Locality Board agrees the list of recommended schemes to utilise the remaining balance of the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund as outlined in Appendix 1

3. Information: the Rationale and Evidence

- 3.1 At its meeting on 06 June 2023 the Council's Cabinet approved an allocation of £419,400 to South Lakeland Locality Board to utilise during the 2023/24 financial year for the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund.
- 3.2 The Council's Constitution states that the remit of the South Lakeland Locality Board includes to "agree and keep under review the implementation of a one year programme of Local Sustainable Transport schemes for the area. Local Sustainable transport schemes could include footpaths and rights of way, cycling and walking improvements, school streets, community transport support." The Terms of Reference also include for the Locality Board "To advise and make recommendations to a grants panel for community bus grant

applications". At the Cabinet meeting on 11 July 2023, it was resolved that 'the relevant Director will agree with the Chair of the Locality Boards the relevant schemes, criteria, panels and / or working groups to distribute the Investment in Council Plan priority funding relating to the £900,000 for the Sustainable Transport Fund outlined in paragraph 3.10 of the June Cabinet report...' For transparency the Director of Thriving Places is bringing the list of proposed schemes before the South Lakeland Locality Board, in Appendix 1.

- 3.3 The funding delegation referred to in paragraph 3.1 above will help improve public health and the environment by reducing congestion, air pollution, carbon emissions and supporting healthier lifestyles.
- 3.4 Officers from the Council's Highways Delivery Team undertook Walk the Ward exercises with Members in Spring and Summer 2023. From these exercises a number of suggestions were submitted which could be delivered using the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund. In addition, officers from the Council's Countryside Access, Sustainable Transport and Safe & Strong Communities teams are in receipt of previous requests from Members and local communities which could also be delivered using the Fund.
- 3.5 The initial criteria was developed and agreed by the Director of Thriving Places and Chair of Locality Board. A long list of 60 potential schemes was assessed by officers using the agreed scoring and rating. Each entry was assigned a feasibility score and rating. This grading assessed if the funding could be committed to deliver the scheme by 31 March 2024 and also considered other elements including alignment to Council Plan priorities, any land ownership issues that would require resolution, the estimated cost of the scheme and any environmental implications.
- 3.6 On 12 September 2023 the long list was presented to Members of the South Lakeland Locality Board - Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group. At the conclusion of this meeting Members agreed that the group would reconvene on 27 September 2023 to further refine the list of schemes. At the meeting on 27 September 2023, Members of the Working Group endorsed the first phase of schemes which were endorsed by the South Lakeland Locality Board on 18 October 2023. The Director of Thriving Places subsequently agreed with the Chair of the Locality Board the first phase of relevant schemes to receive investment and decisions were recorded in an Officer Delegated Decision Record dated 30 November 2023 and published. The estimated cost of the first phase of schemes was £130,200 leaving a remaining balance of £289,200.
- 3.7 On 06 December 2023 a long list of 73 potential schemes was presented to Members of the South Lakeland Locality Board Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group. Following discussions and advice from officers of the relevant teams Members of the Working Group endorsed the second phase of schemes as presented in appendix 1 of this report and are recommending that these are also endorsed by South Lakeland Locality Board.

- 3.8 The list of schemes presented in appendix 1 of this report includes an application from the Morecambe Bay Partnership for the Arnside to Grange Trail. This application was initially submitted to the Council's Partnership Fund however did not receive any funding through this mechanism. Officers from the Council's Climate and Natural Environment Team have asked if this application can be considered for the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund. Background information from the applicant regarding the Arnside to Grange Trail is at appendix 2 of this report.
- 3.9 The total estimated cost of the schemes listed in appendix 1 of this report is £241,999. This will leave a balance of £47,201 remaining from the original allocation £419,400 to the South Lakeland Locality Board. It is recommended that the remaining balance is set aside as a contingency to reflect any potential cost increases in delivering the schemes.
- 3.10 The Director of Thriving Places will agree with the Chair of the Locality Board all the relevant schemes to receive investment as outlined in appendix 1 and the decisions will be recorded in an Officer Delegated Decision Record and published.

4. Link to Council Plan Priorities: (People, Climate, Communities, Economy and Culture, Customers, Workforce)

- Supporting active, healthy happy lives for young and old.
- Supporting people in need and reducing inequality.
- Providing leadership in the drive to become carbon net zero.
- Confident, empowered, resilient communities.
- Sustainable, inclusive, economic growth

5. Consultation Outcomes (with services, ward councillors & public consultation where required

5.1 Consultation has been undertaken with Members via the South Lakeland Locality Board – Building Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group who approved the list of schemes detailed in this report.

6. Alternative Options Considered

- 6.1 To utilise the funding for other schemes. The schemes presented are those which officers have indicated are the most feasible to deliver within the finite funding available, the timescale for utilising the funding and remit of the Local Sustainable Travel and Transport Fund.
- 6.2 Not to utilise the funding. This will present a reputational risk for the Board as the funding has already been allocated for the 2023/24 financial year.

7. Financial Implications and risk

- 7.1 The recommendation of this paper is that the the Locality Board approves the schemes set out in Appendix 1 totalling £241,999.
- 7.2 This is to be funded from the £419,400 allocated to South Lakeland Locality Board for a Local Sustainable and Transport Fund to be utilised in 2023/24 (Cabinet 6 June 2023). The South Lakeland Locality Board – Buidling Community Assets and Addressing Inequalities Working Group are recommending the Locality Board approves the schemes set out in Appendix 1 totalling £241,999. This along with the earlier allocation of £130,200 (18th October 2023) totals £372,199 leaving £47,201 available to use as a contingency sum

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Background

ATOG (Arnside to Grange) formed over 10 years ago in response to high level community interest in the Arnside Viaduct being adapted to enable walkers and cyclists to cross the Kent Estuary and provide a new traffic-free link between Grange-over-Sands and Arnside.

The group has raised funds internally and externally to commission several studies and undertake cost exercises for creating a trail link between the two communities. In 2022 Morecambe Bay Partnership took the lead for the partnership group in commissioning a feasibility study and undertaking community consultation to progress the vision to a Strategic Outline Business Case (SOBC) required for serious consideration.

The partnership steering group has representation from the key stakeholders required to back a scheme of this nature:

- Network Rail
- Lake District National Park Authority
- Westmorland & Furness Council
- Natural England
- Cumbria Community Rail Partnership (Furness Line)
- Holker Estate
- Dallam Tower Estate
- Sustrans
- Arnside & Silverdale AONB
- Founder community members, interested parties and local landowners

The ATOG partnership exists to promote and achieve a vision for a traffic-free accessible trail connecting the communities of Arnside and Grange over the Kent Estuary by creating an iconic promenade style attraction and practical carbon reducing active travel link. If successful, the opening of the Arnside to Grange Trail will be good news for Westmorland and Furness's future, connecting communities, increasing active travel, improving health and wellbeing, reducing carbon emissions while boosting the local green economy and creating a fantastic attraction for visitors and local people to enjoy.

Our activities align to the following Westmorland & Furness Council Plan priorities:

For People, supporting active, healthy happy lives for young and old. **For Climate,** in the drive to become carbon net zero.

For Communities, working closely with residents and businesses to enable them to shape their own destiny and thrive. Building strong links with parish and town councils. A thriving voluntary and third sector.

For Economy and culture, sustainable, inclusive, economic growth. Retaining our young people and attracting investment and skilled people.



What the funding will support

The funding will increase capacity to enable the progression of a range of activities that will offer a major contribution to the region's efforts to engage with the climate emergency, and the national net-zero targets, link communities, create exciting low carbon solutions and accessible active travel experiences for all.

Firstly, we intend to progress the Arnside to Grange Trail scheme to Outline Business Case (OBC) status which is the planning phase of the project and acts as the final technical assessment stage prior to the initiation of scheme procurement. The purpose of the OBC is therefore to:

- Confirm the investment option which optimises Value for Money (VfM):
- Prepare the scheme for procurement; and,
- Put in place the necessary funding and management arrangements for the successful delivery of the scheme.

We will commission PJA consultants to provide the technical engineering, environmental, active travel planning and place making expertise, and we will directly work with partners and the community to achieve:

- agreement in principle from Network Rail;
- robust plans for development, management and maintenance of the trail route;
- engagement of local people and behaviour change toward a shift from a reliance on motor vehicles to public transport and active travel options;
- improvements in health and wellbeing of the population by more people becoming active and exercising outdoors;
- greater understanding, appreciation and care for the natural environment of Morecambe Bay;
- new active travel opportunities;
- support for the scheme that provides a compelling case for construction funding.

The Technical Work

- Development of an Outline Business Case
- Full team site visit with Network rail and employment of a Banksman
- Environment Agency and Lead Local Flood Authority liaison/projection work
- Landscape Appraisal
- New visualisations
- Value Engineering and Specification work
- Arnside Station access and village traffic reduction work
- Commission Network Rail expertise to submit a Form A certificate of approval in principle.



Community and Partnership Work

Morecambe Bay Partnership are currently delivering complementary low carbon active travel initiatives. This grant would increase our capacity to create a culture whereby people look for alternatives to motor vehicle transport as their first option around the coast of Morecambe Bay. Along with our work to champion walking and cycling routes that connect communities and provide leisure activity, and accessible trails for people with mobility issues, we are investing in infrastructure and opening our first Community Active Travel Hub at Grange Station to make active travel more accessible. The grant will give us the capacity to engage more with the local community, visitors, businesses, and other partners to raise the profile of active travel options and benefits, increasing participation in walking, cycling and local green infrastructure development.

Cycling and walking is the only practical way to achieve true carbon net zero movement of people. The creation of safe, easy, accessible active travel routes that connect communities should be seen as a priority in the toolkit to tackle carbon emissions. Active travel will never be for everyone or every occasion, but investment in quality infrastructure is essential to encourage and enable more people to change their behaviour. The Arnside to Grange Trail would be a showpiece example of how Westmorland and Furness are serious about active travel playing its part in tackling climate change, achieving net zero, protecting natural habitats, improving the environment whilst providing quality leisure space for local communities.

The proposed construction of a 5.5km raised boardwalk along the railway embankment and a cantilevered bridge over the viaduct creates a new leisure space that also limits the current harmful encroachment by people and dogs onto the highly sensitive saltmarsh. The enclosed trail route can play an important part in reducing bird disturbance and preventing damage to sensitive flora and fauna. These are all factors of concern locally to us and our partners Natural England and RSPB who are tackling this problem. We believe the trail provides an opportunity to bring people closer to nature and educate them to care about the special environment and wildlife of the Bay.

During our 2022/2023 feasibility work we engaged with local communities sharing our plans for a trail and seeking their opinion.

During a 2-week survey period over 6,000 people responded and gave the trail their overwhelming support. **99.6% supported the trail** (2.6% with some reservations).

Two drop-in consultation events in Grange-over-Sands and Arnside were attended by over 500 people who were keen to see plans and ask questions of the team. The feedback was incredibly positive.

This scheme is more popular with local people than any other we have worked on.



Wider benefits

Eden Project Morecambe will generate an influx of new visitors interested in the environment, nature, Morecambe Bay and sustainable tourism. The trail experience will entice visitors to extend their trip, spending money further round the Bay benefiting local Cumbrian businesses and communities.

The scheme gives a high VfM 'Benefit to Cost Ratio' of 2.61 derived from figures from similar schemes like the Keswick to Threlkeld Trail. This only represents active travel benefits; actual benefit will be higher.

Contribution / benefit to local people:

- New leisure facilities, connecting communities, safe cycling and walking.
- New volunteering opportunities bringing people together with an interest in lowcarbon life choices and helping others
- Promotion of active travel; making bikes, Trampers and mobility scooters easily accessible to local people; events and new community networks
- Organisations who aspire to net zero working together
- Free active travel taster sessions, guided rides, walks and events that improve the health and wellbeing of local people
- Practical solutions to the climate emergency available in the community.

1. Executive Summary

- 1.1 This report sets out the responses to the statutory consultation and advertising of the Order referred to at paragraph 2.1 of this report.
- 1.2 All of the proposals are summarised in the statutory notice which is attached in Appendix 1.
- 1.3 The plans attached as Appendix 2 to this report show the extents of the proposed restrictions.
- 1.4 The Councils' statement of reason for proposing to make the Order is attached as Appendix 3.
- 1.5 The report seeks a resolution on the proposed introduction of the Order.

2. Recommendation

For the reasons set out in this report, it is recommended that -

2.1 Having taken into account the representation which were received during the statutory consultation and advertisement and having also taken into consideration the matters contained in Section 122(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 which are more specifically referred to at paragraph 8.1 of this report, that the Westmorland and Furness Council (Various Bridges - South Lakeland Area) (Traffic Regulation) Order 20>< be brought into operation as advertised.

3. Information: the Rationale and Evidence

- 3.1 The Council has been requested by the Council's Bridges and Structures Team to consult upon weight and traffic restrictions. The proposals are as follows;
 - 3.1.1.1 Introduce a prohibition of all motor vehicles on that length of the U5528 heading towards Middle Fell Farm, near Great Langdale, from a point 24 metres north of the centre of its junction with the U5528 towards Stool End, extending over the full expanse of Middle Fell Bridge;
 - 3.1.1.2 Introduce a 7.5 Tonnes maximum gross vehicle weight limit on the following Bridges:
 - a) U5614 Main Drain Bridge, near Levens;
 - b) U5082 Water Yeat (Old) Bridge, near Water Yeat;
 - c) U5001 Bridge End Bridge, near Little Langdale; and
 - d) U5001 Fell Foot Bridge, near Little Langdale.
 - 3.1.1.3 Introduce a 10 Tonnes maximum gross vehicle weight limit on the U5518 Newland Mill Bridge, near Newland Bottom.

(NB: There are no exemptions to the above proposed restrictions.)

3.2 Middle Fell Bridge, near Great Langdale – The bridge has been assessed as capable of carrying vehicles up to 10 tonnes weight. As a weak bridge, it should be signed with a weight restriction. However, the required signage at this location would be detrimental to the character of the area, with consideration of the nature of the approaches (agricultural field to the north), the confines of the approaches (narrow walled track to the south). and the character of the area (picturesque tourist location). The road carried by the bridge is unsurfaced; at the bridge there is a thin layer of cobbles laid directly onto the extrados of the structural arch barrel. Tracking of motorised vehicles over the bridge will therefore be causing damage to the structure of the bridge because of lack of distribution of wheel loads. Further surfacing of the road would cause detriment to the character of the area by significantly altering the appearance of the bridge, including the need to increase the height the parapets of the arch to accommodate thickness of the road surface. It is evident on site that all vehicles accessing Middle Fell Farm and the field immediately to the north of the Middle Fell Bridge are using the adjacent spur of the U5528 over Dungeon Ghvll Bridge as an alternative, therefore this alteration to access would not be a deviation from present preferred routes to access properties over the bridge. For this reason, it is proposed to prohibit all motor vehicles over the full expanse of Middle Fell Bridge.

U5614 Main Drain Bridge, near Levens;
 U5082 Water Yeat (Old) Bridge, near Water Yeat;
 U5001 Bridge End Bridge, near Little Langdale; and
 U5001 Fell Foot Bridge, near Little Langdale:-

An inspection and structural assessment of these bridges has found that each bridge is incapable of carrying any load exceeding 7.5 tonnes without unacceptable risk to members of the public and damage to the road and structure. For this reason, it is proposed to introduce a 7.5 tonnes maximum gross vehicle weight limit on each of the bridges.

- 3.4 U5518 Newland Mill Bridge, near Newland Bottom An inspection and structural assessment of Newland Mill Bridge has found it is incapable of carrying any load exceeding 10 tonnes without unacceptable risk to members of the public and damage to the road and structure. For this reason, it is proposed to bring in a 10 tonnes maximum gross vehicle weight limit over the bridge.
- 3.5 Attached as Appendix 1 is the statutory notice for advertising and consultation. Attached as Appendix 2 are the plans detailing the extents of the proposals. Appendix 3 is the Council's Statement of reason for proposing to make the Order.

4. Link to Council Plan Priorities: (People, Climate, Communities, Economy and Culture, Customers, Workforce)

4.1 A safe, sustainable and serviceable highway network underpins the Council Plan Vision for Westmorland and Furness to be a great place to live, work and thrive and supports many of the Council's priorities. A reliable highway network enables people, goods and service to be moved around the Authority area promoting new business creation, economic growth and enabling people to thrive within their communities.

5. Consultation Outcomes (with services, ward councillors and public consultation where required)

- 5.1 Statutory Consultation and advertising began on Thursday 7th November 2023 and concluded on 30 November 2023.
- 5.2 4 responses have been received regarding the proposals as follows;

1 response was to the proposals for Middle Fell, Fell Foot and Bridge End bridges

1 response was to the proposals for Main Drain and Water Yeat (Old) bridges

- 2 separate responses were for proposals for Main Drain Bridge.
- 5.3 Support was indicated for the proposed restrictions at Middle Fell Bridge, Fell Foot Bridge and Bridge End Bridge.

- 5.4 Requested in the feedback was that signage required to be installed to indicate restrictions to highway users, should the proposals be approved, at Middle Fell Bridge, Fell Foot Bridge and Bridge End Bridge, that the designs should consider the context and environment and not be placed on the boundaries of historic properties to minimise any negative impact.
- 5.5 Should the proposed restrictions be approved for these bridges this will be taken into consideration and every effort taken to ensure signage is sensitively placed whilst ensuring it adheres with the legal requirements.
- 5.6 3 responses have been received regarding the proposed 7.5 tonnes gross vehicle weight limit.
- 5.7 A request was received for Main Drain Bridge to have an exemption to allow refuse vehicles of 12 tonnes. This is to be able to facilitate the collection of waste and recycling due to being a single track road with limited turning for the council's collection vehicles, the nearest junction being 300 yards away.
- 5.8 An inspection and structural assessment of Main Drain Bridge has found that they are incapable of carrying any load exceeding 7.5 tonnes without unacceptable risk to members of the public and damage the road and structure. The assessment aims to avoid danger to persons or other traffic using the road which runs over the bridges, and to prevent the use of the road by vehicular traffic in a manner which is unsuitable having regard to the existing character of the road and bridge. Consideration is given to the needs for efficient distribution of goods and services along with the needs of the environment and communities. Nevertheless, since the risk is unacceptable it is not possible to exempt vehicles above the proposed weight limit to use the bridge.
- 5.9 An objection to the proposed weight limit at Main Drain Bridge was received. The objection was that farm machinery and delivery vehicles use this road to access Levens Village and Lords Plain. The objection said that this was the only alternative route for the A590 and widely acknowledged as a dangerous section of road. Additional farm vehicles, delivery vehicle turning onto the road as the Hare and Hounds pub to Gilpin Bridge crossing the carriageway will increase the hazards, increasing the likelihood of accidents and potential temporary closure of the A590. Movement of excavators for drainage of the farmland on this area will be compromised. The road can serve as a strategic alternative route to the A590 in the event of a temporary closure of the A590. The issue is if the consultation is taking the safety of the current specific bridge in isolation from the overring requirement for a replacement at a greater capacity as was previously the case.
- 5.10 An inspection and structural assessment has found that it is incapable of carrying any load exceeding 7.5 tonnes without unacceptable risk to members of the public or damage to the road and structure. The assessment aims to avoid danger to persons or other traffic using the roads which runs over Main Drain Bridge, and to prevent the use of the road by vehicular traffic in a manner which is unsuitable having regard to the existing character of the road and bridge. Consideration is given to the needs for efficient distribution of

goods and services along with the needs of the environment and communities. Nevertheless, since the risk is unacceptable is it not possible to exempt vehicles above the proposed weight limit to use the bridge. This is not an agreed diversion route for the A590. Diversion routes for the A590 are only be approved on A, B, or C classification roads.

- 5.11 1 response has been received in support of the proposal for Main Drain Bridge but did raise a concern regarding enforcement as following the implementation of temporary signage at the bridge large LGV's have been seen using the bridge.
- 5.12 Enforcement of the proposed restrictions, should the Order be approved, would be for Cumbria Constabulary who have the powers to take enforcement action. Cumbria Constabulary have been consulted regarding all the proposed restrictions.

6 Alternative Options Considered

6.1 The inspection and structural assessment findings indicate without the proposed restrictions members of public would be at unacceptable risk. There is not therefore a suitable alternative.

7 Financial Implications and risk

- 7.1 If Locality Board decide to agree recommendation at paragraph 2.1 the estimated the cost in terms of staff resources and advertising would be £3,500 and any implementation measures as a result of the making of the Order are estimated at £13,750. This would be funded through the Central Bridge Assessment Review budget.
- 7.2 The Locality Board are asked to note that if it is decided to agree recommendation at paragraph 2.1 the ongoing maintenance cost of signage for the restrictions is approximately £50 a year which would need to be met from within the Highways revenue budget.

8 Legal & Governance Implications

8.1 Westmorland and Furness Council, as Traffic Authority, must take into consideration the matters contained in section 122(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("the 1984 Act") detailed below, in considering whether it is expedient to agree to bringing the Order into force as per the Recommendation in this Report for the reason specified at sections 1(1)(a), (b) and (d) of the 1984 Act, namely: -

(a) for avoiding danger to persons or other traffic using the roads or any other roads or for preventing the likelihood of any such danger arising, or

(b) for preventing damage to the roads or to any building on or near the roads, or

- (d) for preventing the use of the roads by vehicular traffic of a kind which, or its use by vehicular traffic in a manner which, is unsuitable having regard to the existing character of the roads or adjoining properties.
- 8.2 Under Section 122(2), the matters which must be taken into account in exercising that duty are: -
 - (a) The desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises;
 - (b) the effect on amenities of an area;
 - (c) the national air quality strategy prepared under section 80 of the Environment Act 1995;
 - (d) the importance of facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and of securing the safety and convenience of persons using or desiring to use such vehicles; and
 - (e) any other matters appearing to the authority to be relevant.

Pursuant to Paragraph 14.12.2 (d) of the Constitution, Locality Boards may "consider and determine traffic regulation orders, speed limit orders, experimental orders, parking places orders and revocation orders, with the exception of those that require urgent determination or are temporary in nature, in all cases, the relevant local member will have been notified of the matter.)"

9 Human Resources Implications

9.1 There are no human resources implications for consideration in connection with the TRO proposals or decision whether to make the Order.

10 Equality & Diversity Implications (including the public sector equality duty, Armed Forces Families, Care Leavers and Health inequalities implications)

10.1 The restrictions on the bridges have been considered carefully and are required on health and safety grounds for the travelling public. There are not considered to be any equality or diversity implications as a result of these restrictions or this decision.

STATEMENT OF REASONS

Westmorland and Furness Council considers that it is expedient to propose make the above Order for the following reason (s) in Section 1(1) Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984:

(a) for avoiding danger to persons or other traffic using the roads or any other roads or for preventing the likelihood of any such danger arising, or

(b) for preventing damage to the roads or to any building on or near the roads, or

(d) for preventing the use of the roads by vehicular traffic of a kind which, or its use by vehicular traffic in a manner which, is unsuitable having regard to the existing character of the roads or adjoining properties.

For the following:

Middle Fell Bridge - Prohibition of Motor Vehicles

(Drawing SLBRIDGE2023.02.1.1)

The issues with this bridge, which have led to us deciding to prohibit motorised vehicles over it are as follows:

- The bridge has been assessed as capable of carrying vehicles up to 10 tonnes weight. As a weak bridge, it should be signed with a weight restriction. However, the required signage at this location would be detrimental to the character of the area, with consideration of the nature of the approaches (agricultural field to the north), the confines of the approaches (narrow walled track to the south), and the character of the area (picturesque tourist location).
- The road carried by the bridge is unsurfaced; at the bridge there is a thin layer of cobbles laid directly onto the extrados of the structural arch barrel. Tracking of motorised vehicles over the bridge will therefore be causing damage to the structure of the bridge because of lack of distribution of wheel loads. Further surfacing of the road would cause detriment to the character of the area by significantly altering the appearance of the bridge, including the need to increase the height the parapets of the arch to accommodate thickness of the road surface.
- It is evident on site that all vehicle accessing Middle Fell Farm and the field immediately to the north of the Middle Fell Bridge are using the adjacent spur of the U5528 over Dungeon Ghyll Bridge as an alternative, therefore this alteration to access, we believe, would not be a deviation from present preferred routes to access properties over the bridge.

Water Yeat Bridge - 7.5 Tonnes Maximum Gross Vehicle Weight Limit (Drawing SLBRIDGE2023.02.2.2)

Bridge End Bridge - 7.5 Tonnes Maximum Gross Vehicle Weight Limit (Drawing SLBRIDGE2023.02.2.3)

Fell Foot Bridge - 7.5 Tonnes Maximum Gross Vehicle Weight Limit (Drawing SLBRIDGE2023.02.2.4)

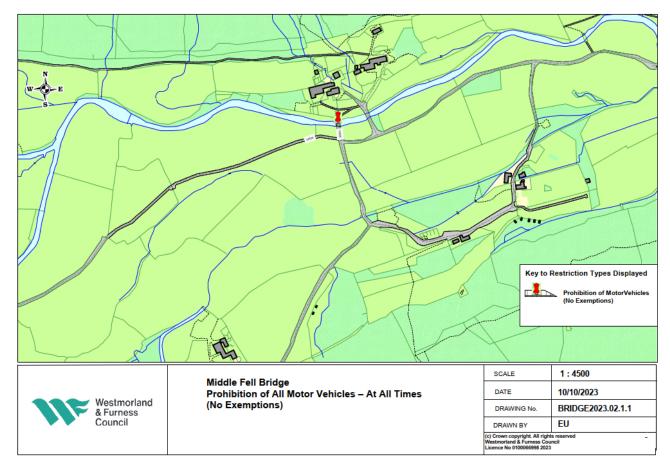

Responses

Lake District National Park

Middle Fell Bridge – appreciate the consideration of the landscape and historic environment impacts of a weight restriction. It is required infrastructure at this site and support the proposed prohibition of vehicles. The bridge links to a public footpath and removal of traffic will improve the amenity of the bridge and reduce damage to the surface.

Fell Foot Bridge – support the proposed weight limit. This is a sensitive location in a iconic valley in the Lake District National Park and World Heritage Site please consider the signage carefully to be in keeping with its context and to minimise any negative impact.

Bridge End Bridge – support the proposed weight limit. Should be noted the bridge itself it listed and the attached Bridge End Cottage and attached barn are Grade II listed. Please consider that all signage is not on located on the boundaries of these buildings, is in keeping with the setting of this historic property.

Response

Thank the Lake District National Park for their comments and should the proposals be approved careful consideration will be given to the signage required to be installed with consideration of the surroundings and environment.

Waste and Environmental Services – Westmorland and Furness Council

U5614 Main Drain Bridge – request an exemption of 12 tonnes to facilitate the collection of waste and recycling. This is a single track road with limited turning for the council's collection vehicles, the nearest junction being 300 metres away. U5082 Water Yeat (Old) Bridge – request an exemption of 12 tonnes to facilitate the collection of waste and recycling. Introduction of a 7.5 tonnes maximum gross weight limit will create a 45 metre reverse in order to service 4 properties closest to the bridge. No objection to the proposals for Middle Fell, Bridge End Bridge, Fell Foot Bridge and Newland Mill Bridge.

Response

Thank the Waste and Environmental Services for their feedback. An inspection and structural assessment of Main Drain Bridge and Water Yeat (Old) Bridge has found that they are incapable of carrying any load exceeding 7.5 tonnes without unacceptable risk to members of the public and damage the road and structure. The assessment aims to avoid danger to persons or other traffic using the road which runs over the bridges, and to prevent the use of the road by vehicular traffic in a manner which is unsuitable having regard to the existing character of the road and bridge. Consideration is given to the needs for efficient distribution of goods and services along with the needs of the environment and communities. Nevertheless, since the risk is unacceptable is it not possible to exempt vehicles above the proposed weight limit to use the bridges.

1. Executive Summary

- 1.1 This report sets out the responses to the statutory consultation and advertising of the Order referred to at paragraph 2.1 of this report.
- 1.2 All of the proposals are summarised in the statutory notice which is attached in Appendix 1.
- 1.3 The plans attached as Appendix 2 to this report show the extents of the proposed restrictions.
- 1.4 The Councils' statement of reason for proposing to make the Order is attached as Appendix 3.
- 1.5 The report seeks a resolution on the proposed introduction of the Order.

2. Recommendation

For the reasons set out in this report, it is recommended that -

2.1 Having taken into account the representation which were received during the statutory consultation and advertisement and having also taken into consideration the matters contained in Section 122(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 which are more specifically referred to at paragraph 8.1 of this report, that the Westmorland and Furness Council (Various Roads, South Lakeland Area) (Traffic Regulation) Order 20>< be brought into operation as advertised.

3. Information: the Rationale and Evidence

- 3.1 Parking restrictions were brought in under emergency powers followed by a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO) made by Cumbria County council in the summer of 2022 in response to parking taking place which was causing an obstruction at:
 - a) A65 Bentnick Drive, Kirkby Lonsdale
 - b) U5527, U5528 and B5343 at Dungeon Ghyll, Great Langdale
 - c) B5343 Near Elterwater; and
 - d) A591 Jenkins Field, Ambleside
- 3.2 TTRO'S can be in place for a maximum of 18 months. As the temporary restrictions have shown to be beneficial for road safety through removing obstructive parking it is proposed to make these permanent through a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO).
- 3.3 Additional Parking restrictions are also proposed to be implemented on Birch Street in Windermere. There is a section of No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow line) restrictions at the junction with Crescent Road which are not enforceable due to an error in a previous TRO, and it is proposed to include these restrictions so they can be enforced to prevent obstructive parking.
- 3.4 Additional No Waiting at Any Time restrictions are proposed at U5532 Pelter Bridge following obstructive parking which is preventing access to properties.
- 3.5 It is also proposed to introduce Police Parking Bays at 2 locations, namely
 - a) A591 between its junctions with Benfield and Greenhead Fold Grasmere; and b) A6 Shap Road in Kendal

This will allow police vehicles and speed camera vans only to park within the bays and carry out proactive enforcement of the speed limits at these locations without being impeded.

3.6 The proposals also included the removal of the "No Waiting, 8.00 am – 7:00 pm, Full Week" restrictions on the U5527 Great Langdale, the U5528 Great Langdale and the B5343 Great Langdale; and the removal of the "No Waiting at Any Time" restrictions on the A591 Lake Road (south of Waterhead the northbound cycle bypass pull-in), and on the U5532 Steps End Road, Pelter Bridge. To enable the implementation of the restrictions listed in 3.1 to 3.5 requires the revocation of several TRO entries across the locations as listed in the notice.

4. Link to Council Plan Priorities: (People, Climate, Communities, Economy and Culture, Customers, Workforce)

4.1 A safe, sustainable and serviceable highway network underpins the Council Plan Vision for Westmorland and Furness to be a great place to live, work and thrive and supports many of the Council's priorities. A reliable highway network enables people, goods and service to be moved around the Authority area promoting new business creation, economic growth and enabling people to thrive within their communities.

5. Consultation Outcomes (with services, ward councillors and public consultation where required)

- 5.1 Statutory Consultation and advertising began on Thursday 19th October 2023 and concluded on 9 November 2023.
- 5.2 3 responses have been received regarding the proposals.
- 5.3 One request was received in support of the proposed No Waiting at Any Time restrictions at A591, B5343, U557, U5528 at Great Langdale and U5532 Pelter Bridge on the basis the measures had made a material difference to the traffic and amenity for both residents and visitors in and passing through these locations. Support indicated for the measures to become permanent.
- 5.4 An objection was received in support of the proposed No Waiting at Any Time restrictions at A591 Jenkins Field, Ambleside and A65 Bentick Drive, Kirby Lonsdale. The objection said that the proposals were unnecessary as the roads already have controlled double white line system which prevents stopping or parking vehicles and is an offence requiring police enforcement. The objection to "Removing the "No Waiting at Any Time" restrictions on the A591 Lake Road (south of Waterhead the northbound cycle bypass pull-in)". The continued use of the waiting restriction is necessary to prevent "pull-in" from being used as a parking space by vehicle users. Cyclists use the pull-in for its intended purpose. Removal of the double yellow lines will only encourage its use as a permitted parking place.
- 5.5 It is correct that vehicles parked on a road marked with double white lines can receive a fixed penalty notice from the police. The Council, with support from Cumbria Constabulary, have proposed to install No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) restrictions so they can be enforced by the Council's Civil Enforcement Officers. This is beneficial in areas where obstructive parking is taking place repeatedly as enforcement levels can be increased. A further benefit is that the Council's Civil Enforcement Officers can enforce on both side of the double yellow line, up to the edge of the highway, meaning they can enforce against vehicles parking on the verge/footway.

- 5.6 An objection was also received to the removal of No Waiting at Any Time restrictions, at A591 Jenkins Field, Ambleside and A65 Bentnick Drive, Kirkby Lonsdale however these are not proposed to be removed but extended. Due to the way legal schedules are written, existing restrictions have to be revoked in the legal wording of the legal schedules and replaced with the wording which includes the proposed extension. As the restrictions in this location have been in place since summer 2022 (under a temporary traffic regulation order which we are proposing to make permanent) the road markings will remain as presently marked out, should this Order be approved. Please note; if the Order is not approved, or in relation to this part, then the temporary restrictions will expire and need to be removed.
- 5.7 An objection to the proposed provision of the police vehicle parking bays was also received. The objection stated *"Home Office and DoT criteria for siting of speed cameras, fixed or otherwise, are not met at these locations so their deployment cannot be justified and may be unlawful. Oppose any measures which serve to perpetuate what is quite simply an industrial scale penalty farming racket it is clear these speed camera vans, apart from failing to reduce collisions, may well be actually responsible for causing them through distraction. There are too many unnecessary penalties being issued often in cases where the speed limit it set well below the 85th percentile and measures ought to be taken to reduce the number of penalties being issued not increasing them."*
- Cumbria Constabulary Speed Camera Van Team have advised that there are 5.8 no legal criteria that have to be followed for the implementation of the Police parking bays which are also to be used by the Speed Camera Vans. Both these sites were set up as a result of public concern, investigated by the Casualty Reduction and Safer Highway (CRASH) group made up of Cumbria Constabulary, the highway department and statutory bodies. These sites have been deemed appropriate for enforcement due to the number of vehicles travelling above the speed limit. Data provided by Speed Camera Team for Shap Road Kendal indicates that the speed camera van has been deployed 18 times since March 2023 at this location and 747 Notice of Intended Prosecution have been issued. The deployment of speed camera vans is an important function in reducing vehicle speeds across the Westmorland and Furness Council area and improving road safety. Introduction of a legal order to make the bays usable only by Police vehicles (and Speed camera vans) will ensure that this important function can continue without being impeded and should a non-police vehicle park in the bay, enforcement action can be taken.

6 Alternative Options Considered

6.1 It is considered that there are not any other measures that can be introduced that will be as effective as these proposed parking restrictions.

7 Financial Implications and risk

- 7.1 If Locality Board decide to agree recommendation at paragraph 2.1 the estimated cost in terms of staff resources and advertising would be £3,500 and any implementation measures as a result of the making of the Order are estimated at £3,100. The cost of this work would be funded through the Annual Package of Measures budget, which is included within the Highways capital budget. Please note the part of the Order making permanent restrictions currently in place by a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order there are no new road markings required.
- 7.2 The Locality Board are asked to note that if it is decided to agree the recommendation at paragraph 2.1 the ongoing maintenance cost of signage for the restrictions is approximately £30 a year which would need to be met from within the Highways revenue budget.

8 Legal & Governance Implications

8.1 Westmorland and Furness Council, as Traffic Authority, must take into consideration the matters contained in section 122(2) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("the 1984 Act") detailed below, in considering whether it is expedient to agree to bringing the Order into force as per the Recommendation in this Report for the reason specified at sections 1(1)(a), (b) and (c) of the 1984 Act, namely: -

(a) for avoiding danger to persons or other traffic using the roads or any other roads or for preventing the likelihood of any such danger arising, or

- (c) for facilitating the passage on the road or any other road of any class of traffic (including pedestrians);
- 8.2 Under Section 122(2), the matters which must be taken into account in exercising that duty are: -
 - (a) The desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises;
 - (b) the effect on amenities of an area;
 - (c) the national air quality strategy prepared under section 80 of the Environment Act 1995;
 - (d) the importance of facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and of securing the safety and convenience of persons using or desiring to use such vehicles; and
 - (e) any other matters appearing to the authority to be relevant.

Pursuant to Paragraph 14.12.2 (d) of the Constitution, Locality Boards may "consider and determine traffic regulation orders, speed limit orders, experimental orders, parking places orders and revocation orders, with the exception of those that require urgent determination or are temporary in nature, in all cases, the relevant local member will have been notified of the matter.)"

9 Human Resources Implications

9.1 There are no human resources implications for consideration in connection with the TRO proposals or decision whether to make the Order.

10 Equality & Diversity Implications (including the public sector equality duty, Armed Forces Families, Care Leavers and Health inequalities implications)

10.1 The parking restrictions have been considered carefully and are required on health and safety grounds for the travelling public. There are not considered to be any equality or diversity implications as a result of these restrictions or this decision.

11 Background Information & Sources (used in preparation of this Report)

- 11.1 The statutory requirements of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and the Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 have been followed and will be signed/lined in accordance with the Traffic Sign Regulations and General Directions 2016.

Statement of Reasons

Westmorland and Furness Council ("the Council) proposes to make the above Order, for the following reasons in Section 1(1) Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984:

- a) for avoiding danger to persons or other traffic using the road or any other road or for preventing the likelihood of any such danger arising, or
- c) for facilitating the passage on the roads or any other roads of any class of traffic (including pedestrians)

A6 Shap Road and A591 Grasmere – Proposed "No Stopping" (Except for Police) Restrictions

Alongside Cumbria Constabulary and Cumbria Road Safety Partnership, the Council seeks to reduce the total number of people killed or seriously injured in collisions in the Westmorland and Furness area year on year. Cumbria Constabulary requested we install parking areas suitable for mobile safety cameras in Kendal and Grasmere to gather data and provide evidence for enforcement due to community speeding concerns raised leading the Police to believe there is likelihood of danger arising. A risk review by the Council, to national guidelines, has shown that the locations chosen could be used for parking at any time by members of the public or businesses to park nearby local amenities. This would lead to the the mobile safety camera operations team being unable to perform their duty in reducing the likelihood of danger arising from increased vehicles speeds beyond the posted speed limit.

We therefore we propose a permanent Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to prohibit stopping except for Police Vehicles (including those directed by the Police) to ensure the parking bays are available for the mobile safety camera operations team as shown on the following plans:

Birch Street, Windermere – Proposed "No Waiting At Any Time" Restrictions

Bentinck Drive Kirkby Lonsdale – Proposed "No Waiting At Any Time" Restrictions

The measures brought in on a temporary basis made a material difference to the traffic and amenity for both residents and visitors in and passing through these locations and we support these measures becoming permanent. These measures were raised through and supported by the multi-agency Tactical Visitor Management Group (now the Strategic Visitor Management Group, SVMG) and were set out in the Area Action Plans developed as part of this group's remit. Really pleased to see the introduction of further restrictions at Pelter Bridge. The parking at this location has led to residents being unable to access their properties and genuine concerns that emergency services would not be able to reach them if needed. These measures were also raised through the SVMG and were supported. Would suggest working with the highways department to ensure signage at the LDNP car park clearly advises that there is no parking beyond that point to prevent people driving up the road 'just in case' and causing congestion.

Response

Thank the Lake District National Park for their comments. An advisory sign which has been ordered with the wording as follows; 'Narrow Lane, No parking or turning beyond this point'. This will be positioned after the entrance to the car park.

This is beneficial in areas where obstructive parking is taking place repeatedly as enforcement levels are increased. A further benefit is that the Council's Civil Enforcement Officers can enforce on both sides of the double yellow line, up to the edge of the highway, meaning they can enforce against vehicles parking on the verge/footway. however, Home Office and DoT criteria for the siting of speed cameras, fixed or otherwise, are not met at these locations so their deployment cannot be justified and may be unlawful. Oppose any measures which serve to perpetuate what is quite simply an industrial scale penalty farming racket as it is clear these speed camera vans, apart from failing to reduce collisions, may well be actually responsible for causing them through distraction. There are far too many unnecessary penalties being issued often in cases where the speed limit is set well below the 85th percentile and measures ought to be taken to reduce the number of penalties being issued not increasing them. Both these sites were set up as a result of public concern, investigated by the Casualty Reduction and Safer Highway (CRASH) group made up of Cumbria Constabulary, the highway department and statutory bodies. These sites have been deemed appropriate for enforcement due to the number of vehicles travelling above the speed limit.

- Data provided by Speed Camera Team for Shap Road Kendal indicates that the speed camera van has been deployed 18 times since March 2023 at this location and 747 Notice of Intended Prosecution have been issued.
- The deployment of speed camera vans is an important function in reducing vehicle speeds across the Westmorland and Furness Council area and improving road safety.
- Introduction of a legal order to make the bays usable only by Police vehicles (and Speed camera vans) will ensure that this important function can continue impeded and should a
